Humility and Gift

A great joy for me is reading what Andrew Hamilton SJ writes in *Eureka Street,* a free online publication of the Australian Jesuits. Here is an example from 8 April 2021:

(In the) world, differences between human beings based on education social status, nobility of birth and intelligence, human activity in it, and achievement are all gifts available for the shaping of a just world.

That view came under pressure with the separation of faith from public life and the emphasis on the individual rather than the communal. It then became easier to see one's gifts and the skills that went into financial success as achievements, not gifts. In this world competitive success entitled people to reward. It demonstrated merit. Those who lost out in competition had no merit. They were the undeserving poor, the losers, whose misery and exclusion from society gilded the merits of the successful winners. The canopy over the world was economic competition with all its divisions, and not gift with its bindings together.

So, let's pray that we focus on the reality that all that comes our way is gift. Humility rests in knowing that all is gift bestowed not merit. And our response? To worship. The words from a prayer capture that:

All that I am, all that I do, all that I'll ever have, I offer now to You. Take and sanctify these gifts for Your honour, Lord.

A Synodal Church: Dream or Possibility?

Our interstate facilitator, Phil Billington, led those in attendance at our recent statewide gathering and AGM in a lively look at, and discussion on, synodality and its potential. People felt engaged and fully in participation. She summarised the responses of those present to the question: What would synodality mean for CCT?

ACCCR first Convocation with Joan Chittister a great success....

"the Catholic Church must grow up", Sr Joan said, "beyond the parochial to the global, beyond one system and one tradition, to a broader way of looking at life and its moral, spiritual, ethical frameworks".

She called for lay Catholics to be treated "as equals, as seekers, as spiritual adults. Old styles of worship, old criteria of piety, old ways of relating to the world . . . good as all of them may once have been . . cannot build for us a new Jerusalem in this place in this time when the forces of history face us with new challenges.."

Sr Joan observed, "The old church with its parochial provincialism, is long dead". Nonetheless, her concluding message was one of hope: "My hope has never been higher. We must be mountainclimbing people." People will lead and leaders will follow. She urged all present to be the "carriers of the new age" and hoped for an "open, honest and heavenly Plenary Council".

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Recent developments in CCT

The Committee of CCT met by Zoom on Monday 7th June:

AGM and Synodality Discussion. It was agreed that this was a successful morning, with Phil Billington's input and facilitation generating animated and engaging discussion.

Pre-Plenary Diocesan Assemblies. We were grateful that these events had been organised and pleased to see so many CCT aligned attendees. The emphasis on delivery meant that there was inadequate time for discussion, leading to very short feedback. CCT has written to the Church Office to seek the discussion outcomes.

Schools Strike 4 Climate. There was considerable support for our stance and media release from members and others. We were disappointed in the response from the Executive Director of Catholic Education Tasmania, particularly in light of the Pope's strong messages of the need for action on climate. The Chair will be writing to the Chair of the Catholic Education Commission of Tasmania regarding the Executive Director's response.

Laudato Si events. Planning is well underway for this chance for CCT members and others to engage in a guided presentation and discussion on this inspiring document from Pope Francis. Details are elsewhere in this newsletter.

Committee Reflection. The Committee, whilst engaging in prayer at each meeting, feels the need for more time for this dimension of our lives. A day facilitated by Sr Jill Dance SSJ is planned for July.

200 Years of Catholic Education. Those in attendance at this celebratory Mass were dismayed at the low numbers present. CCT is also hearing of concerns about the increasing level of centralised control and diminishing subsidiarity (a key Catholic principle) within Catholic Education Tasmania.

Plenary. CCT will endeavour to keep contact with Archdiocesan delegates to help them hear the voices of the faithful they will be representing at the Plenary. The Plenary Council organizing group has provided information and resources for parishes to publish in the leadup to the Plenary Council. The question was asked "How well prepared is Tasmania to participate in the Plenary Council?".

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A synodal approach to Synodality!

The Vatican announced recently that the Synod of Bishops on synodality has been postponed to 2023, with a two-year consultative preparatory phase involving Catholic dioceses worldwide. The synod on synodality will officially open with a "diocesan phase" in October 2021 and conclude with the XVI Ordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops at the Vatican in October 2023.

Cardinal Mario Grech, the general secretary for the Synod of Bishops, said that the synod has been transformed "from an event into a process." "The Second Vatican Council teaches that the People of God participate in the prophetic office of Christ. Therefore, we must listen to the People of God, and this means going out to the local churches," Grech said.

During the diocesan phase, each bishop is asked to undertake a consultation process with the local Church from Oct. 17, 2021, until April 2022.

CCT is seeking advice from our Archbishop on how consultations will occur and offering assistance in planning and organisation.

Synodality - Proposal to re-structure Melbourne Archdiocesan parish system. A paper has been prepared in consultation with some Melbourne ACCCR affiliate members and other lay people and priests and is circulating widely. Priests and parishioners are concerned that a planned re-structure of the Melbourne Archdiocese by the Archbishop is currently being carried out without due consultation and without due attention to the possible implications for the Faithful. The paper recommends that the Archbishop wait for the Plenary Council outcomes, which hopefully will be in support of a more synodal approach and the establishment of an Archdiocesan Pastoral Council as a means to engage in discernment with the Catholic community before decisions such as this are made.

ACCCR 2021 Convocations The next Convocation (Following the very successful first one featuring Sr Joan Chittister) will be held on **Thursday 26th September at 7.30pm**. It will address the Plenary Council and how hopes and expectations for that are developing. There are plans to have a panel of speakers followed by 'Chat Room' discussions.
